What was your experience like when you first moved out to Los Angeles? Also, what was the first gig you booked when you moved out here? I went back and forth to L.A. for four years, I would go for the pilot season but then come back to Vancouver. I don't have that story of "oh my god, I went down to L.A. and booked a show the first time out and went straight to series." People hear stories like that, and it makes it sound like it's so easy, and it's not. You have to set yourself up. You have to have an agent and a manager. If you're not coming off of something where they are aware of who you are, your team has to "sell" you. They bring you in for a pre-read, and the casting directors decide whether the producers will see you. It takes a while, and they want to know that you are consistent and that they can trust bringing you into the producers and not screw it up. They don't want to look bad because it's their reputation too. There are a million girls ahead of you that have been doing this for years. I had friends who booked shows the first time they went to Hollywood. For people to think that's the norm and it's easy, it's just not the case.

Did you feel welcome when you first went out to Los Angeles?

I had some friends that were Canadian as well whom I would hang out with here and there. I moved out there with my then-boyfriend, who was also an actor. We had each other, which was nice and could be supportive of each other. Luckily, I wasn't doing it all by myself. It could be lonely at times, and it was also expensive (laughs). You would save up to go out to dinner. It was tough, but at the same time, I was hyperfocused on what I needed to do. It wasn't about going out and socializing. It was about working, studying, making sure that I did an excellent job, and honing my craft. I wanted to make sure I was staying on course.

What was it like pursuing your career in Canada?

It was a much smaller pool of actors at the time, and it still is today, but there's also more work now. You still had to pay your due, but there's always that lucky break. I was doing commercials, and I had a few cameo type roles. I had this role for a movie on NBC at the time with Faye Dunaway, Stephen Collins, and Cameron Bancroft, who is Canadian and whom I ended up working with for the first time since then. I was eighteen when we first worked together, so it was pretty cool because it came full circle. I was also modeling in Japan at the time and going back and forth on contracts over there. I was trying to save up enough money to go to L.A., and I ended up booking up a lead for a Showtime project. It was my first big break in Vancouver. I went from being seen from co-stars and commercials to being recognized for the lead roles in projects. It took a little less time than what it does for some people. Some people take additional time and some people less time, but that's just how it happened. I still had to work hard, and it was by no means easy.

What is your dream role to play? If you could play opposite any actor who would it be?

I would love to play opposite Robert Downey Jr., and I would love to do an action film like Angelina Jolie in Salt, Mr. & Mrs. Smith, or something like Iron Man. I am a massive fan of superhero films and their physicality because it challenges and excites me. It's the stuff that I like to watch, and I want to be in something that I would want to watch (laughs).

We know that One Tree Hill has a huge fan base. What was your experience like working on that show? How did you get the role of Nicki? Do you still keep in touch with any of the cast members?

I auditioned for it, and I believe they had been looking for this girl for a while. I remember it was pouring rain outside and it was cold when I got the call for the audition. It was two in the afternoon. and I remember I had to be there at five o'clock. Those are the worst because you're just thinking, "oh god, I hope there's not much material" It can be stressful. I looked at the sides, worked on it as much as possible, and just got in the car. They taped me, and everyone was out in North Carolina filming. The next day or the day after that they called me and told me I got it. It was a recurring role, but they didn't know how many episodes it would be. I flew down to Wilmington, and the cast and the crew were genuinely excellent. I still see some of the cast members at the conventions, and I attended one not too long ago in Raleigh, North Carolina. It was fun to see Chad and some of the others I hadn't seen in a while. I run into Paul Johanson once in a while because we go to the same gym or the coffee shop next to it (laughs). He's fantastic, and he's such a great guy. We had a blast working on the show together.
